Anchors Aweigh: Highlights from the 2025 Gyro International Convention

ohn and Laura, Angelo and Lucy, Doug and Annette, and Ken and Ann boarded the Grand Princess on June 3 for an Alaskan cruise. We were joined by about 130 Gyros and Gyrettes for the annual Gyro International Convention. This year's Gyro Convention set sail in style, kicking off with a spirited welcome reception in a panoramic aft room overlooking the Vancouver skyline as it slowly slipped from view. President Mike Eisner officially opened the proceedings, acknowledging our District's contributions — with well-deserved kudos to Ted Ewanchuk and Dunc Mills for orchestrating a memorable voyage.

Old friends reunited, new connections blossomed, and the energy was high. It was a pleasure to see Roy and Lynne Penniket from the former Lethbridge club, and equally delightful to share the occasion with six spirited single ladies from previous Gyro connections — a lively reminder that camaraderie knows no bounds.

The next day began with the Past District Governor's Meeting, where Alan Pentney chaired 21 dedicated participants. Our discussions spanned five important

topics, which were later forwarded to the Board of Governors for consideration. In the afternoon, the Board reviewed the financials and approved a budget that keeps dues at \$70 for now, though a By-Law update allows for flexibility up to \$90 in future years. Our reserves remain healthy, with over \$100,000 in the coffers.

Membership currently stands at 1,461 — a dip of 212 over the last two years, due in part to the departure of the Vancouver, Washington club. Nevertheless, clubs like Edmonton and Port Colborne Niagara provided optimism: Edmonton drew potential recruits by inviting a local golf group to a baseball game (sports diplomacy at its finest), and Port Colborne has grown from 7 to 30 members in four years through smart networking.

We're excited to report that the 2026 Convention has been approved for Calgary, July 13–17, at the

On June 7, the AGM was held to a full room. Our club's delegate, Doug Campbell, represented us. New International officers were elected

The AGM's main agenda item was a sweeping governance restructuring: shifting from 9 Districts to 3, with the 3 Governors joining the Executive Council. This required nearly 1,000 word-level amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws. A total of 28 motions were tabled in advance, with several others introduced by the Past Governors and directly from the floor. While one motion tried to reverse course and return to District governance, it was voted down. A compromise motion did pass to retain the names "District" and "District Governor" within the new framework — a nod to our heritage. Two motions to allow women to become active, duespaying members were defeated for the fourth time in a decade.

Yes, it was a marathon 3.5-hour session — but all business was handled, and no one jumped ship.

That evening, we gathered for the Formal Ceremony in a grand showroom, complete with piped-in dignitaries, heartfelt speeches, and the ceremonial passing of leadership.

On the final day at sea, a special luncheon brought everyone together one last time. Fellow Gyros were handed brochures and were invited to join us in Calgary next year for the 2026 Gyro International Convention.
